With your support....

We were able to transport homeless animals from under-resourced, rural shelters in Southwest Virginia. Our Adoption Program did not let background, shyness, illness, injury, or the size of a dog determine if they were fit to be in our program.

In 2019, we helped **535 animals** find forever homes. Adopters visited from eight different states across the East Coast from New York to Florida to bring home four-legged family members from Anicira.

Anicira is committed to reducing unnecessary euthansia by helping under-resourced shelters and rescues. Our shelter's staff and volunteers work hard to save the dogs that are at highest risk and enjoy seeing each transformation and success in finding their forever homes.

Anicira Vet Center performed mass removal surgery and Amy's foster started her weight loss journey. By August, Amy found an adoring family. This would not have been possible without Amy's amazing foster caregiver, who worked on curbing her separation anxiety, helped her lose weight, and managed her post-surgerical recovery.

Amy is now living out her golden years in a wonderful home playing with her family. Donations from supporters and special care from her foster caregiver gave her story a happy ending!

Drax found his new mom, Jessica, at the Bob Wade Suburu adoption event and they could not be a better match. Drax goes with Jessica almost everywhere and they spend a lot of time outside being active.

"Drax is very happy and healthy, almost 80lbs and STILL GROWING! He is very smart and trainable, and loves going to the dog park and running free on my parents' farm," said Jessica. "He has learned to catch a frisbee, does pretty well off-leash and is learning to run safely alongside a four-wheeler when I need to get some work done on the farm. The other day he hit a running speed of almost 25mph!"

Drax is a great companion to Jessica and will soon be certified as her emotional support dog. We are so glad Drax and Jessica found each other!



Tiny's Recovery

Tiny came into Anicira's Harrisonburg Clinic suffering from a chronic ear infection and with a broken canine tooth. Tiny's ear infection has been treated and now that her mouth has healed from the extractions she desperately needed, she is back to being the sweet girl that purrs the loudest. Tiny's treatment was made possible by support and funding of the Hildred Neff Grant.

Sandy's Recovery

Sandy and her littermates were found abandoned in a trash bag inside of a dumpster. Surprisingly, most of the the kittens were doing well, but sweet Sandy was not. She was emaciated, suffering from hypothermia, hypoglycemia and infested with fleas and intestinal parasites- Sandy came to us barely clinging to life.

Thanks to a Good Samaritan, Sandy was brought to us just in time. Our medical team quickly stepped in and began emergency treatments to save Sandy's life.

With the support of our donors, Sandy was able to receive the necessary medical attention and care that she desperately needed.

While Sandy is still recovering from this traumatic event, she is improving every day and is flourishing in her temporary home. We are grateful to be able to help pets in need and provide life-saving care like we did for Sandy.

Kairi's Story

Kairi came in to have a mass on her left front foot looked at by our doctor and it was determined that it would be best to have it surgically removed. Because of the location of the mass we had to remove the mass and amputate one of her digits for a successful removal. Kairi recovered beautifully and is doing great!


